Beaverdam Baptist Association CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I: CHARTER STATEMENT

Section 1. This association shall be known as the Beaverdam Baptist Association.

Section 2. This association is a religious corporation pursuant to the provisions of the South Carolina Non-Profit Corporation Act.

Section 3. The principal office is located at 1659 Sandifer Boulevard, Seneca, SC 29678-0906.

Section 4. The purpose of this association is to encourage mutual fellowship and voluntary cooperation in mission causes among its affiliated churches.

Section 5. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, this organization shall not carry on any activities not permitted to be carried on by an organization exempt from Federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law.

Section 6. The Baptist Faith and Message, adopted in 2000 by the Southern Baptist Convention, is a summary of our Baptist doctrine. The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the sole authority for our faith and practice.

Section 7. This association retains the right to determine its own membership.

Section 8. Upon the dissolution of the corporation, assets shall be distributed for one or more exempt purposes within the meaning of section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, or corresponding section of any future federal tax code, or shall be distributed to the Federal, state or local government for a public purpose. Any assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the Court of Common Pleas, of the county in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes.

Section 9. In the event this association ceases to exist, or upon vote of the duly empowered officers of the Association that it should cease to exist, the assets of the association, including land, buildings, furniture and fixtures and equipment, bank accounts, savings accounts, Certificates of Deposit, and all investments and trust accounts shall be conveyed to the Baptist Foundation of South Carolina, a 501(c)(3) corporation, to be used by the Foundation in the work of missions to benefit some other Baptist association or Baptist entity as directed by the Trustees of the Baptist Foundation of South Carolina.

ARTICLE II: MEMBERSHIP

This association shall be composed of messengers, Executive Board members, officers, members of associational teams and committees and any other person elected or appointed to a position within the association and who are members of Baptist churches which are duly affiliated according to the procedures hereinafter set forth in this constitution.

ARTICLE III: AUTONOMY

The relationship between the association and its affiliated churches implies mutual responsibility. However, the autonomy of each entity shall be rigidly preserved, neither entity having power to exercise authority over the other.

ARTICLE IV: RELATIONSHIPS

Section 1. Composition:

Churches in the association voluntarily enter a relationship of cooperative support and fellowship. As a self-determining body, the association determines its own membership and ministry but has no authority over the member churches. However, the association may, upon invitation from a church, advise that church.

Section 2. Application for Membership

A church desiring to become a part of the Beaverdam Baptist Association shall pursue membership through the following process:

(1) Initially the church will write a letter of application to the Executive Board at least six months before the annual session. If the Executive Board accepts the application, the church will be admitted under watch care status.

(2) Prerequisites for application are: willingness to function under watch care status for a minimum of one year, establish appropriate distance from existing Beaverdam Association churches, and be sponsored by a church already a member of the Beaverdam Baptist Association.

(3) During the year of watch care status, the church will work under the supervision of the sponsoring church with assistance from an Ad-Hoc Committee appointed by the moderator to attain the following minimum requirements for admission into the association: develop a constitution and by-laws; demonstrate financial cooperation with the association, South Carolina Baptist Convention and Southern Baptist Convention; organize for worship, evangelism, education and discipleship; make long-term arrangements for a meeting place; endorse the 2000 "Baptist Faith and Message"; and receive a recommendation from the sponsoring church.

(4) The Ad-Hoc Committee will bring the recommendation relating to the church's admission to the association at the annual session after one year of watch care status. The Ad-Hoc Committee will monitor the progress of the watch care churches with procedures found in the Book of Policies & Procedures.

Section 3. Exclusion from Membership

This association may at any time withdraw fellowship from or deny fellowship to any church. Any church failing to submit an Annual Church Profile shall be notified annually of this requirement by the Associational Clerk. If the church fails to comply for three consecutive years, it shall automatically be dropped from the association along with churches requesting withdrawal or being disbanded.

Section 4. Messengers

Each church may send its pastor and three (3) additional messengers to the annual session. For every fifty (50) members or fractional part thereof over twenty-five (25), above the first fifty (50) the church may send

one additional messenger. No church shall have more than ten (10) messengers. Messengers shall provide satisfactory evidence of their election by their church to the association.

Section 5. Cooperation With Others

The association will cooperate and fellowship with sister associations, the South Carolina Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. The association is an autonomous body not controlled by any other entity.

ARTICLE V: AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended or altered during annual session by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present. The proposed change must be submitted in writing to the Executive Board at its July meeting. It will be read and explained at the October Executive Board meeting. Amendments to the proposed change shall be discussed and voted on at the annual session of the association.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I: MEETINGS

Section 1. Annual

The annual meeting of the association will be held on the Monday after the fourth Sunday in October. For cause, the Executive Board may alter the date of this meeting. Registered messengers shall constitute the voting body for the transaction of business. The rights of messengers to participate in business conducted at the annual meeting shall be determined by submission of registration cards (provided by the associational clerk) certifying that they have been duly elected as messengers by an affiliated church and the completion of the Annual Church Profile. Credentials will be issued only to eligible messengers.

Section 2. Executive Board

The Executive Board of the association will meet in the months of October, January, April, and July to transact business on behalf of the association. All regular meetings will be scheduled in the associational calendar. This board will be composed of one pastor and two additional members from each affiliated church, associational officers, and coordinators of associational organizations and Ministry Team leaders. The moderator shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as secretary. This board shall have full authority to transact any business pertaining to the association in the interim between annual sessions,

but at all times it shall endeavor to carry out the expressed will of the association. The clerk shall give a detailed report of all business transacted to the annual associational meeting.

Section 3. Special

The moderator may call a special meeting of the Executive Board if the necessity demands. Adequate advanced notification must be given to all members of the time, place, and business of the meeting. None other than stated business shall be transacted at this meeting. Ample time must be provided for discussion.

Section 4. Quorums

The majority of the members present, unless otherwise specified shall govern this association, in all its deliberations. Messengers representing no fewer than twenty (20) affiliated churches shall constitute a quorum for annual meetings. A quorum for Executive Board meetings shall be constituted by no fewer than twenty (20) members, representing no fewer than ten (10) affiliated churches.

ARTICLE II: OPERATIONS MANUAL

An Operations Manual will be maintained and reviewed at least every three years by representatives from each team. It shall contain the structure, guidelines and functions of all volunteers as well as policies and

procedures essential for administering the association. Revisions can be made by a simple majority vote of the messengers at the annual session or by the Executive Board, provided the revision does not conflict with or violate the association's Constitution and Bylaws.

ARTICLE III: FISCAL POLICIES

The fiscal year is January 1 – December 31. All persons authorized to receive and/or disburse associational funds shall be bonded. The association shall bear the expense of bonding. An internal audit of the association's books shall be conducted annually or as deemed necessary.

ARTICLE IV: ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The associational year shall begin September 1 and end August 31.

ARTICLE V: PARLIAMENTARY

AUTHORITY

The current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* shall be the parliamentary authority for all meetings of the association. The moderator may appoint a parliamentarian for consultation at regular or special meetings.

ARTICLE VI: AMENDMENTS

Any bylaw may be amended by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers either at an annual session or by a two-thirds majority vote of the members at an Executive Board meeting.

Bylaws Adopted October 22, 2001

OPERATIONS MANUAL

INTRODUCTION

This Operations Manual describes the principal functions and duties of the officers, Executive Board, teams and committees of the association. The Executive Board conducts the business of the association in between annual meetings. Each member church selects their Executive Board members annually. Teams help the association accomplish its work of helping churches reach and disciple people for Christ. All elected leadership are to be members of a member church.

OFFICERS

Officers give assistance to the administration of the association's work and may succeed themselves except for the moderator and vice-moderator. The officers of the association shall be: moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, assistant treasurer and trustees. The moderator and vice-moderator shall be elected from the floor at the annual meeting. The Nominating Committee shall nominate the clerk, treasurer, assistant treasurer, and trustees. The moderator and vice-moderator shall not serve more than two consecutive years except in the event they are completing unexpired terms. The trustees shall be composed of three laypersons.

Clerk

Principal Function: Record minutes of annual meetings, Executive Board meetings and special meetings of the Executive Board; then submit them to the associational office for publication.

Duties: Attend annual meetings, Executive Board meetings and special meetings of the Executive Board; maintain and make available minutes of past annual meetings, Executive Board meetings

and special meetings of the Executive Board for publication.

Moderator

Principal Function: Preside at annual meetings, Executive Board meetings and special meetings of the Executive Board.

Duties: Serve ex-officio at team meetings; encourage churches to work with the association to fulfill the vision; may appoint special committees as directed by the association.

Treasurer

Principal Function: Examine supporting data and co-sign all checks written from the association.

Duties: Serve ex-officio at team meetings; work with teams in submitting an annual budget; attend annual meetings, Executive Board meetings and special meetings of the Executive Board; make available the books for annual audit.

Assistant Treasurer

Principal Function: Assist the Treasurer as needed.

Duties: In the absence of the Treasurer, perform all duties of the Treasurer as needed. Will be asked to fulfill an unexpired term of a previous Treasurer.

Trustees

Principal Function: Hold in trust all properties of the Beaverdam Baptist Association, and to transact all legal matters pertaining thereto, subject to the direction of the association.

Duties: Hold in trust all properties of the association; transact legal matters pertaining to the association.

Vice-Moderator

Principal Function: Assist the moderator and preside at annual meetings, Executive Board meetings and special Meetings of the Executive Board in the absence of the moderator.

Duties: Serve ex-officio at team meetings; encourage churches to work with the association to fulfill the vision; will be asked to fulfill an unexpired term of a previous moderator.

EXECUTIVE BOARD

Principal Function: To conduct associational business in between annual meetings of the association. Officers of the association serve as officers of the Executive Board.

Duties of Individual Members:

1. Pray that God may use the meetings for the accomplishment of His will and that you represent your church well at the meetings.
2. Be familiar with the Constitution and By-Laws, the Operations Manual and principles of parliamentary procedure in preparation for participation in meetings.
3. Read over the minutes of the last meeting, review any advance reports for the next meeting and arrange schedules in order to attend all meetings.
4. Be familiar with the human needs of your community and the strategy the association is using to meet those needs.
5. Be a responsible participant and exercise your best judgment in conducting the business of the association through listening to presentation and discussion.
6. Take notes on the presentations and discussion at the meeting so that you can share them with your church members and suggest ways your church should respond to the business conducted.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

Principal Function: To conduct associational business on the behalf of the Executive Board in between its quarterly meetings.

Duties:

1. This committee shall be composed of the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer and three members-at-large elected by the board from among its members as nominated by the Nominating Committee. No member shall serve more than three consecutive years with the exception of the clerk and treasurer.
2. The Executive Committee shall meet before the quarterly Executive Board meeting in sufficient time to develop an agenda for the Executive Board meeting and to notify Executive Board members of the agenda. The vice-moderator shall serve as the chair.
3. This committee shall have authority to make necessary decisions on behalf of the Executive Board,

but at no time shall any decision be made contrary to the expressed will of the association or the Executive Board and at no time shall decisions of major importance be made without the direction of the Executive Board.

4. The Executive Committee may, in an emergency, authorize an unbudgeted expenditure; but at no time shall an expenditure be authorized more than one percent (1%) of the annual associational budget.

5. This committee shall make a complete report of any action taken to the quarterly Executive Board meeting.

6. The responsibilities of the Annual Meeting Committees are assigned to the Executive Committee: plan and coordinate the program for the annual meeting; receive, review and recommend resolutions to be considered; and recommend the place, preacher and alternate preacher for the succeeding year's meeting.

TEAMS

Ministry teams will be organized to carry out the work of the association by providing practical application of the association's vision and mission. The Beaverdam Baptist Association will mobilize three ministry teams: Leadership Development Team, Missions Exploration Team and Missions Mobilization Team.

Each team should consist from five to seven team members as a core group but add, as necessary, an unlimited number of team associates that are willing to help churches. Except where noted, ministry team members will be presented at the October Executive Board meeting for approval. The associational staff will work with each of these teams. The term of service for all leaders and teams will begin upon election. Team members may succeed themselves. The moderator and director of missions will be *ex-officio* members of all teams.

Team Members are:

1. Responsible for researching, assessing and meeting the diverse and changing needs of churches as requested, either individually or collectively, and seek where God is moving and join Him.
2. Asked to meet quarterly at a minimum to coordinate its work with the staff and implement strategies to better serve churches.
3. Teams shall keep minutes (or other record) of meetings, a copy of which shall be maintained on file at the associational office.
4. Asked to report on their team's activities to the Executive Board and to the annual meeting.
5. Enlisted by the Team Leader and approved by the Executive Board except where coordinators or persons are selected by the Nominating Committee. Care will be given to be inclusive in enlisting team members and associates and will include pastors.

6. Asked to network churches to partner in ministry and missions by addressing community and global needs.

7. To develop ongoing relationships with ministers by fostering small regional groups where they can pray, share and have fellowship.

8. To do one-on-one consultations with churches, as requested.

9. To work with the Stewardship Committee to prepare a budget for the association that will be presented and discussed at the October Executive Board meeting and voted on without discussion at the October annual meeting.

Leadership Development Team

The team would be made up of at least 7 members.

1. This team would receive input from the church leadership for areas of desired training and information. It would include all pastors (full time, bi-vocational, and interim's), associate pastors, staff members (ministers of music, youth, children, education, & secretaries), and deacons. The team would also focus to work with areas of Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Vacation Bible School, WMU, Men's Ministry, and age-related leadership development. This team would also offer other training for Leadership Development as requested by the Association churches.

Missions Exploration Team

This team would focus on Local Mission projects that would receive input from WMU and Men's Ministry. The intent would be to explore and implement local mission opportunities available for our member churches to become involve in. The team would consist of at least 5 members. Their focus would be:

1. Local mission projects (example: homeless shelter, food bank drives, medical clinics, Oconee Medical Center Chaplain, Clemson International Ministry, campground ministries, sporting ministries (golf course, marathons, whitewater stops, and so forth). Festival ministries, (Apple Festival, various Fall Festivals, and seasonal parades). The team would explore how we as Christians can influence and impact in some way these areas within the Greater Oconee County area.

2. The team would explore focused evangelism opportunities.

3. The standing committee of Disaster Relief would also have a member on this team to identify those requiring their involvement in times of disasters in our area.

Missions Mobilization Team

This team would combine our Judea (state), Samaria (national) and Uttermost Part of the Earth (international). The team would consist of at least 5 members with each having an area of responsibility. The team would identify mission opportunities that all member churches could participate in. The identification

efforts would come through our State and National Conventions. But primarily, there would be a consistent communication with our member churches to open the opportunities for other Associational churches to join them in their mission projects. We have recognized that many of our churches are smaller in number and may not have the financial and people resources to pursue mission projects beyond their communities. However, by combining their efforts with other member churches, they would be able to go and participate as God leads them. The standing committee of Disaster Relief would also have a member on this team to identify those requiring their involvement in times of disasters in our area.

ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT SERVICES

Nominating Committee:

The committee shall be composed of three members elected by the Executive Board on a rotating basis (one per year for a three-year term). This committee shall nominate the three ministry team leaders as well as ministry coordinators such as Sunday School, Discipleship & Family Ministries, Youth, Men's Ministry, Evangelism, Music, and Senior Adults for election at the October Executive Board meeting. The three ministry team leaders, when elected shall serve as members of the Nominating Committee. In addition, the committee will nominate persons to fill the Nominating, Personnel, Stewardship Properties Committees, Trustees, Campers Scholarship Committee, Senior Adult Committee, and Oconee Counseling Center Advisory Committee. Due consideration shall be given the recommendation from within each organization.

1. The committee of six shall make all nominations to the association, unless otherwise specified, and shall name the chairman of all committees, including the Nominating Committee.

2. The Committee shall nominate persons to fill unexpired terms.

Personnel Committee:

This committee shall be composed of three members elected by the Executive Board on a rotating basis (one per year for a three-year term). They shall serve in an advisory relationships to all employed personnel. The duties of this committee are to develop and maintain personnel policies and procedures, to review job descriptions annually with respect to job performance, to make annual salary recommendations to the Stewardship Committee and to administer any other matter pertaining to employed personnel. This committee shall recommend new staff positions, as needed.

Stewardship Committee:

The committee shall be composed of six members elected by the Executive Board on a rotating basis (two per year for a three-year term). It shall be responsible for planning and promoting all matters relating to Christian stewardship in the association. It shall have responsibility for planning and presenting the annual proposed budget to the Association. It shall oversee the work of the treasurer, who will serve as an *ex officio* member of the committee. This committee shall have the responsibility of promoting the Cooperative Program in the association. It shall also be the responsibility of this committee to secure an annual audit of the treasurer's records for presentation to the April meeting of the Executive Board.

Properties Committee:

This committee shall be composed of three members elected by the Executive Board on a rotating basis (one per year for a three-year term.). Its duties are to arrange for the repair and maintenance of all properties of the association and to propose to the Stewardship Committee annual budget allocations for property improvements.

COMMITTEES

Principal Function: Standing and ad hoc committees will be organized to facilitate and advance the objectives of the ministry teams.

Duties:

1. All standing committees, except the Executive Committee, shall be on a rotating system unless otherwise specified, one-third of the membership being elected each year to serve a term of three years.
2. The moderator and the director of missions shall be *ex officio* members of all committees.
3. Each committee shall elect a secretary to record minutes of meetings, a copy of which shall be maintained on file at the Associational office.
4. Ad hoc committees will be purpose-driven committees, appointed by the moderator as needed, to accomplish specific tasks during the year.

AMENDMENTS

The Operations Manual may be amended by a simple majority vote of the messengers either at an annual session or by a simple majority vote of the members at an Executive Board meeting.

*The 128th Annual Session of Beaverdam Baptist Association
Hepsibah Baptist Church, Seneca, South Carolina*



In his book, *A History of South Carolina Baptist*, Dr Joe M. King gives the founding of the Hepsibah Church as 1797. In that year the Shoal Creek Church received a petition from a Brother Poe to send ministerial help for a scattered group desiring to start a new church. This new group was organized in June of 1797, located on the Beaverdam Creek. In 1803, Hepsibah became a part of the Saluda Association and later the Serepta Association. From 1815 to 1835 it was called the Seneca River Church. In 1865 Hepsibah became a charter member of the Fork Association. For this reason, many people date the founding of the church from 1865. When the Fork Association became the Beaverdam Association, Hepsibah was a charter member.

Through the years the church has met at several locations. First meeting in the Beaverdam area, they later moved to the Townville side of Coneross Creek near the William Porter place. From there it moved to the site of the Old Hepsibah Church and in 1924 to the former location just off the Friendship Highway.

When the church moved in 1924, the first pastor in the new location was Warren Harbin, who had also pastored at the Old Hepsibah site. Others who have pastored Hepsibah since then include: Clarence Garrett, Furman Moore, Ernest Bailes, J.H. Tannery, Claude Hightower (1944-46), Johnny Honea (1946-53), Paul Duncan (1954-70), A. E. Kelly (1970-79), Billy Bates (1980-87), and John M. McKnight (1987 - present).

In 1956 or 1957, the first building was remodeled and bricked. Rev. Paul Duncan became the first full-time pastor in 1962. The mortgage on a new pastorium was burned by the church in July of 1972.

On Easter Sunday, April 19, 1981, the church voted to begin construction on a new building to contain both sanctuary and educational space. Some weeks before it had been decided by a majority vote to build on the site of the old Friendship School. On January 12, 1984, the church voted to build additional educational space and a fellowship hall. The note on these building was paid in full in October 1987.

On December 15, 1996, the church voted to build a new sanctuary that would seat 600 and remodel the old sanctuary into educational space. On April 13, 1997, the "Ground Breaking Service" was held. On Sunday, July 19, 1998, the first worship service was held in the new sanctuary.

1. Call to Order. Alvin Burdette (Mt. Pleasant), Moderator, called the meeting to order.

2. Theme Interpretation & Invocation. Brian Goss (Lydia), Vice-Moderator, spoke on "Impacting Oconee and Beyond" (Acts 1:8). Our churches have done so much by the grace of God to Impact Oconee with the love of God by being involved in Good News Clubs, food pantries, homeless shelters, pregnancy center, domestic violence shelter, prison ministry, clothes closets, children's homes, nursing homes, shut-ins, Hospice, and many other local ministries. We can always do more together than we can do alone.

Churches also ministered at Connie Maxwell, the beach, in Kentucky, Ohio, Tennessee, Honduras, and Mexico. Others were involved in the association's partnerships in Atlanta, and Canada with the Myers family. A lot of things go on behind the scenes through our leadership planning for Pastors/Wives Retreats, Countywide Crusade and revivals. Our greatest days are still ahead. As individuals that make up the 66 churches of the association we have the opportunity to be the eyes, ears, mouth, feet and hands of the Lord Jesus Christ. Be the best you can be. Brian led in prayer.

3. Greetings from Host Church. John M. McKnight, pastor, Hepsibah, welcomed messengers. He said it is a privilege to partner with other churches, and an honor to host the Annual Meeting.

4. Congregational Music. Justin Simons lead the congregation in singing "Friend of God" / "Who Can Satisfy My Soul".

Business Session

5. Adoption of Order of Business and the Book of Reports. Bart Kelley (Bethel), moved the adoption of the Order of Business and Book of Reports. The motion carried.

6. Recognitions.

A. New Church Ministerial Staff: Pastors: Chris Moss (Mountain View), Dexter James (Rocky Knoll), Mike Foster (Damascus), Stacy Griffis (Beaverdam). Youth: Andrew Marcengill (Open Door).

B. Guests. Peter Hyatt, Baptist Collegiate Minister at Clemson University, and Jerry Sosebee, Associate Director, Church Health Group, South Carolina Baptist Convention.

Jerry shared greetings on behalf of Dr. Richard Harris, Interim Executive-Director. He gave a personal testimony about the value of participating in the association. His involvement in the BBA Crusader Choir as a teenager had a big impact on him and others, and 8 or 9 became ministers. When he told his home church, Utica, of his call to preach, several ladies turned to the back of their Bibles and told him he was "number 35"—the thirty-fifth to be called to ministry from Utica—and they prayed every Wednesday night in prayer meeting for the "next one" that would be called by God to the ministry. He encouraged messengers to "take care of the home front, and do everything you can to serve the Lord with all your heart."

7. Reports.

A. Stewardship Committee. Randy Keasler (Westminster) presented the Proposed 2015 Budget, calling attention to significant reductions in the budget totaling \$38,049. Our Director of Missions, David Shirley, has done a wonderful job to live within our means. He moved adoption of the budget, and the motion carried.

B. Executive Committee.

(1) Resolutions. David Sluder (Heart Land) moved adoption of the Resolutions Report as printed.

RESOLVED, that we model financial integrity during this continuing economic downturn, through Biblical instruction, generous giving, and sensitivity to community needs, and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge pastors and church members to become educated and informed about the moral issues we face in our nation today; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we pray for all persons in political office and all candidates that are seeking public office; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That we encourage all Christians to get involved in the great blessing God has given us to freely elect our leaders and live in this free nation.

The motion to adopt carried.

(2) Preacher/Place for 2015 Annual Meeting. David Sluder presented the report: that the 2015 meeting be held on Monday, October 26 at Scenic Heights Baptist Church, West Union; and, that the preacher be Pastor Brian Goss (Lydia), and the alternate be Pastor Bart Kelley (Bethel). He moved adoption of the report, and the motion carried.

8. Director of Missions. David Shirley stated it had been an extremely challenging year. He gave highlights of the past year: Pastors/Wives Retreat in March with Dennis Swanberg; and the greatest accomplishment: Brett & Kristin Myers being called to Canada to plant a church. He asked Brett to give an update.

Calgary. Brett expressed appreciation for the prayers, and financial support from churches and individuals. Five hundred Bibles were given to children, and some asked "What's this book". When more Bibles were needed, he shared the need with David, and the Bibles were provided. The teams that are coming to Calgary are making a difference, and had the first salvation this summer. The core leadership is meeting every Wednesday, and hoping to start Southwinds Mahogany Church in March or April.

David said since 2010, 13 churches have sent teams or individuals to Calgary. This past summer an association team did soccer camp.

Facilities, Finances, Future. The BBA building has a "for sale sign" but is not going out of business. We are restructuring to be more effective in the days ahead. The future is bright, and we are putting ourselves in a position to do more.

Children's Camp's theme "Legacy" was about the life of the Apostle Paul. There were 126 campers. The 2015 camp is August 2-6.

The Well, the first church planted since 1993, was launched on September 7, and meets on Sunday afternoon at Seneca High School at 4 p.m. The mission is to find, follow and be like Jesus. Folks are being reached and five have been saved. The Well is targeting the 12,500 unreached who live within a 5 mile radius of Seneca City Hall.

Residence at Park Place Bible Study: Ron Potts (Hepsibah) told about the Sunday morning ministry that started with 10 residents and now has 20-25. Others have been on the team going to share, and some had to drop out, but the ministry has continued. Ron challenged messengers to "get involved, and ask God where He would have you serve. Be prepared to go, and honor Him with the ministry."

Band of Brothers. Bart Kelley talked about the need for accountability groups in the ministry. Many pastors are going at it alone and don't have a friend to share ministry burdens with. Ministers need one another and need relationships that allow for accountability and encouragement. "Band of Brothers is a blessing and is much needed.

Bibles for Canada. When David shared the need for \$2,500 to purchase Bibles for Canada, \$2,500 was received immediately. Money continued to come in and \$2,887.60 is still available to send another shipment. Churches working together.

Response to Pastor's Medical Need: Keith Stephens, pastor at Reedy Fork, was diagnosed with Potts Syndrome, a nervous system disorder that affects major organs in the body. He needed to raise \$5,000 to make an appointment at the Mayo Clinic in Minnesota, David sent the word out, and thus far \$6,806.91 has been given. Keith shared the symptoms he experiences and the impact the illness has had on his life. He expressed appreciation for the work of the association and David Shirley, and for the donations and prayers.

Domestic Violence. Mark Bagwell (Golden Corner) talked about churches working together to combat domestic violence. He gave information about an upcoming meeting and urged others to get involved.

David said "Church, we've got a job to do. The fields are white unto harvest." Fifty-six percent of the population, 42,411 people, in Oconee County are not a part of the faith community.

9. Election and Installation of New Officers.

A. Moderator. Alvin Burdette opened the floor for nomination of Moderator. John McKnight nominated Brian Goss (Lydia) who has been vice moderator for 2 years. There were no other nominations. Brian was elected moderator.

B. Vice-Moderator. Don Bickers (College Street) nominated Randy Koon (Mountain Rest). There were no other nominations. Randy Koon was elected Vice-Moderator.

Worship

10. Music. Justin Simmons led the congregation in singing "Come Thou Fount, Come Thou King".

11. Introduction of Speaker. Jimmy Boggs (Hepsibah) and Steve Black met while working at Duke Power over 30 years ago. He and Steve had great times together,

and have been great friends ever since. Steve has walked through dark times in his life, and good times, and is a trophy of the grace of God.

12. Special Music. Briana Simmons and the Hepsibah Worship Choir sang "This Blood".

13. Annual Sermon. Steve Black (Scenic Heights) read Ezra 1:7-11. God had given Israel a lot of material for the purpose of creating vessels for His worship, but Israel spent years using them for the wrong reasons. We are vessels in God's hand. He created and formed us, and put us in this special place and time. Trophies, forgiven, He still uses us, and He gets the glory.

14. Hymn of Commitment. "Shout to the Lord", led by Justin Simmons.

15. Adjourn. Alvin Burdette adjourned the meeting. Pastor Keith Stephens (Reedy Fork) led in prayer

ANNUAL SERMON

Steve Black, Pastor, Scenic Heights Baptist Church

Scripture: Ezra 1:1-6

God had given Israel a lot of material things, and artisans made instruments for the house of God. Material things. Everything seems to be geared to material things.

Are material things bad? It's how you use them that makes them good or bad. Buddhists, Hindus, New Agers, Wiccans believe the only way to be free from evil is to be free from material things. The Bible teaches that in and of themselves material things are a gift from God. Why? Because God created them. Most of the time we use them for the wrong reasons, and that separates us from God.

Israel spent years using them for the wrong reasons: 1) God gave them the law; they ignored it. 2) God gave them the temple; they worshiped idols. God sent them into exile. They had been warned by prophet after prophet. God said if that's what you want, my power is off of you.

God is speaking to us today. We are at a serious crossroads. Entertainment has taken us over. Sunday and Wednesday church services are not important to us. We wonder why the pews are empty, and why 56,000 people are lost in our county. When the Babylonians took the instruments, they stored them in a warehouse.

The children at Good News Club get a new Bible and ask, who is Jesus? We have failed to take Him into our everyday life. People can't tell we are Christians when we sing praise on Sunday, and our language is the same as the world on Monday. It's a shock that no more churches are saying anything about the Sunday alcohol sales referendum.

The vessels were led away and stored beside pagan gods the Babylonians were worshiping. The vessels meant nothing to them. To the world outside of our doors, church means nothing to them.

God raised up King Cyrus who heard God's voice telling him that it's time to send all the beautiful vessels back and rebuilt the house of worship in Jerusalem.

When the items were counted, there was 5,400 pieces of gold and silver.

The Treasurer didn't describe them by their functions; they were just things to him. When the vessels were transferred from the treasurer to an heir, they became valuable. We've had too many valuable vessels locked within a pagan society—just things. But when they became vessels of God, they became important.

Time to bring them back. There were four stages of restoration before the Lord deemed they were ready.

First stage was restoring items God had sanctified for the purpose of His worship. After Moses came down the mountain, they started making stuff: the Tabernacle, the Ark, priestly garments— all this stuff was to be used to worship God. It must have been important to God; He spent the last five chapters of Exodus describing them in minute detail. Material things are important to God because of how we use them. The problem is, we have placed His stuff in the wrong account.

Transfer from one house to another. These beautiful vessels of God's Temple were in the hands of pagans. They were specially created by and for the worship of God. Made only of the finest material—gold, silver—and by the most skilled artisans.

Only the best, guaranteed to be pure, careful to make sure they were presentable before they were placed into service for the Lord.

Can you imagine what it was like when the Temple was destroyed and it was carried off and stored in pagan temples? God had provided the materials and the artisans for the sold purpose to bring glory and honor to Him.

Nebuchadnezzar took the vessels from Jerusalem, from God's house, and placed them in the house of demons. When resources are used for the wrong purpose, all it takes to change them is a transfer.

What has God gifted you with? What have you done with His resources?

Lost God's Stuff. It was the first time some were seeing the instruments for the first time, beautifully crafted and designed exactly as God wanted. It was important to God.

They were locked away. How did they get them? Keys to opening the store room:

The first thing was to restore the vessels:

1) Idols – no other gods before God. Anything that comes between you and God. We have allowed so many things to take His place. It's time to check our heart. Spiritually we have locks on our heart.

2) Greed – how much is enough? Some people will do anything for a dollar. If you want to find out how much someone loves God, look at his checkbook. People are not numbers, they are hurting. If you have a pastor who visits, you've got a blessing.

3) Immorality – the key is to have a walk that is worthy. It's time we realize the high price Jesus paid for us. We are His ambassadors.

4) Unfaithfulness – key is to remain steadfast in Jesus. God said you have all these things, but you didn't come to the temple as you're supposed to. You're off in Babylon and 70 years has passed. Your children have grown up and now their leaders. Charge them to go back.

5) Selfishness – die to self. We see this every day with this selfish generation. It's all about me. God got sick of it with the Children of Israel.

6) Unforgiveness – forgiveness; grace; mercy. The hardest to unlock is unforgiveness. Bitterness comes in and they won't come to church. At a time when broken and brokenhearted, God said I'm not through with you. I'll forgive you of your sins. 1 John 1:9 1 – If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If you won't forgive, I won't forgive you.

The transfer began to take place. There are pastors and church members who have blazed the trail before us. It's sad to see the church in the shape it's in today. We're responsible. It's been a long time since we've seen vessels used of God. 5,400 used of God. The devil says it's just numbers. God doesn't save junk. He gives his very best to us. When vessels are transferred, they become valuable. God created and formed us, put us in a special place at a special time. We were lost when Jesus saved us; now we're in heirs' hands and become valuable to Jesus. I'm thankful that Jimmy says we're all trophies, forgiven of sin. God uses us still, and He gets the glory. Hold your head high because you are forgiven. Forgiveness at the foot of the cross. In a demon possessed world? God has not forgotten us. Can I be forgiven? Yes! Don't let Satan tear you up and beat you up.

You're a vessel in God's hand. He has put us in this special time. Listen churches, let's work together. Churches in the Walhalla area do a lot of good things together. Jesus saved us and made us somebody.

Thank God for this great association. Pastors meet every Monday at 8:30 am for prayer – do everything you can to get there.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

What a joy it has been for me personally over these past 4 ½ years to serve God as well as the churches of the Beaverdam Baptist Association. I want to say "Thank You" to the churches and Pastors of the Beaverdam Baptist Association for the speaking opportunities that I have been afforded. As I continue serving in this role, the deepest longing of my heart is to truly impact Oconee County with the Good News of Jesus Christ! It is my desire to lead this Association to be an Association that is relevant and one that "Impacts Oconee & Beyond". I covet your prayers as I seek to lead the Beaverdam Baptist Association to truly be an Acts 1:8 Association.

As I looked back over this past year, I thank God for all that took place in our Association. Over the past twelve months as an Association we have....

- Held a NAMB Commissioning Service for Brett and Kristin Myers at Westminster Baptist Church. Brett and Kristin were appointed as NAMB Church Planters/Missionaries to Calgary, Alberta, Canada.
- Hosted the 2013 Minister/Wives Retreat at Hyatt Downtown Greenville with Dr. Dennis Swanberg.
- Hosted our 18th Associational Children's Camp August 3- 7 at White Oak Conference Center
- Continued our Missions Partnerships with Southwinds Church in Calgary, Alberta, Canada
- Had teams from six churches serve in Calgary this summer (Corinth-W, Hepsibah, New Hope, Seneca, Utica and Westminster). Since 2010 we have had 13 churches send teams/people to Calgary.
- Led a Mission Team of fifteen people from various churches in the Association to Calgary, Alberta, Canada in July-August.
- Provided Pastor Search Committee Training for two churches
- Assisted several churches with church consulting (Deacon Training, Revitalization, Conflict Resolution, etc.)
- Started a monthly Pastors Conference on the second Tuesday of each month.
- Held two Ordination Councils
- Utica Baptist Church hosted our 2014 VBS Clinic
- Formed the Facilities, Finances and Futures Committee to look into and make recommendations regarding the present challenges that we are facing in regards to our facilities, finances and future as an Association.

- Planted our first church since 1993. The Church at The Well which meets on Sunday afternoons at 4:00 in the Seneca High School Auditorium.

While it would be a lengthy report to detail each of the above mentioned items, I would like to briefly mention just a couple of them.

As we strive to become an Acts 1:8 Association, not only do we want to focus upon Jerusalem, Judaea and Samaria but we also want to provide our churches with opportunities to go to the uttermost parts of the earth. In 2010 our Association entered into a mission's partnership with Canadian National Baptist Convention focusing upon the Calgary, Alberta area. The statistics detail the spiritual darkness that envelopes our neighbors to the north.

- 34 million people live in Canada
- 95% of all Canadians are lost
- There are only 268 Southern Baptist Churches in all of Canada compared to 2,100 in South Carolina alone
- The province of Alberta is larger than the state of Texas with a population of 3,215,869 with only 53 Canadian Baptist churches (1 for every 60,677 people)
- Alberta is known as the former Bible Belt of Canada
- 7% of Calgary's 1.2 million population are saved - approximately 84,000 people out of 1,200,000

In 2014 we were thrilled to see several of our churches (Corinth-W, Hepsibah, New Hope, Seneca, Utica and Westminster) send mission teams to Calgary to serve alongside the precious folks at Southwinds Church assisting with Upward Tee Ball Camp, Upward Soccer Camp and Community Outreach events. We have received so many positive reports and expressions of appreciation from our Canadian partners about how wonderful the mission's teams are from the Beaverdam Baptist Association.

In March 2014 we hosted our fourth annual Minister's/Wives Retreat at the Hyatt Regency Downtown Greenville. We were honored to have Dr. Dennis Swanberg as our special guest. A wonderful time was enjoyed by all as Dr. Swanberg spent two days encouraging those who so faithfully serve in ministry in our Association. This retreat was our largest retreat ever with 52 couples participating. Our Associational Ministers/Wives Retreat is designed to be a "Weekend of Encouragement" for those who so faithfully serve the churches of Oconee County.

The 2014 **Beaverdam Baptist Association Children's Camp** was held August 3 - 7th at the White Oak Conference Center in Winnsboro, South Carolina. What a blessing God showered upon us at the 2014

Children's Camp. We were thrilled that 126 people participated in our camp including children, high school and college student "Staffers" and Chaperones. A special "Thank You" to Chad Carroll for serving as our Children's Camp Director. The dates for our 2015 Associational Children's Camp will be August 2 - 6.

Without a doubt for me personally, the highlight of 2014 had to be the North American Mission Board Commissioning service for Brett and Kristin Myers. Brett and Kristin answered God's call to go to Calgary, Alberta, Canada and serve as Church Planters. EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING MINUTES

Monday, January 13, 2014

1. Call to order. Alvin Burdette (Mt. Pleasant), Moderator, called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm at the Beaverdam Mission Center.

2. Scripture Reading and Prayer. Alvin read Philippians 4:6-7 and spoke about having the peace of God and 'being able to sleep when the wind blows'. He led in prayer.

3. Recognition of New Members. Butch Butts (Bethel).

4. Minutes of the October 28, 2013 Annual Meeting were approved as printed.

5. Stewardship Committee. On behalf of the committee, David Shirley presented a recommendation to adjust the 2014 budget due to an increase in lawn and parking upkeep. Motion was made and seconded to table until treasurer's report was presented.

6. Treasurer's Report. Financial Summary for October-November-December 2013 was presented by David Shirley and accepted. Giving for the year was down, and the budget was not met. We stayed within the budget, but the funds didn't come in. 2013 ended with a shortage of \$19,635.01. There are serious decisions to be made: operating on far less, meetings done differently, facility, shortening office hours, staffing, etc. **7.**

Stewardship Committee. An adjustment to the 2014 budget for lawn and parking was recommended by the committee. Jerry Maw, dba Jerry's Lawn Care, has provided this service for over 25 years, and includes labor, equipment and material to: cut grass and weed eat as needed; trim shrubs and remove debris; spray weeds in beds and parking lot; blow parking lot. The annual cost has been \$2,316 since 2007. After the budget was approved at the October 28, 2013 Annual Meeting, we received an updated quote for \$2,700 an increase of \$384, which would increase the budget from \$226,635 to \$227,019.

These are challenging times, and declining contributions are not unique to our association; it's statewide. The association is trying to do more with less: Custodian works every other Saturday, 26 weeks per year; Secretary's position was changed from full-time to part-time with no benefits.

Discussion ensued. Motion to take the previous motion off the table and proceed to vote was made and seconded. Randy Keasler spoke in favor of the original motion, and called the question. Recommendation to accept the increased cost of lawn and parking care passed.

8. Director of Missions Report. David Shirley (Seneca) summarized his 4th quarter activities: Pastor Search Committee Training, Marriage Retreat, Deacon Retreats, Church consulting, Mission Partnerships with Atlanta, Calgary, Canada.

There are several mission opportunities for this summer in Calgary: Kids' camp and fun days, basketball, t-ball, soccer. The needs are tremendous in Canada. Mahogany is a new community being built, and will be the

largest one in Calgary. When finished, there will be 18-19,000 homes in a neighborhood, 40-50 thousand people and no church...yet. Through our association's partnership and God's work, Brett & Kristin Myers and their girls will be leaving Corinth Westminster to plant a church in Mahogany, sometime in April. A Commissioning Service for the Myers family as North American Mission Board church planters is planned. He is available to share in churches, and will be raising support.

Upcoming opportunities:

- Children's Camp August 3-7 at White Oak Conference Center.

- Hispanic Church Plant. Churches were encouraged to participate in the Joint Worship Service February 9 at Utica. Pastor Jerry Zapata and his praise team will be leading the service. A Health Fest / Family Festival / Block Party for Hispanics is planned for Saturday, March 1. Help will be needed with paperwork.

- Pastors/Wives Retreat with Dennis Swanberg. Fifty rooms are reserved at the Hyatt in Greenville. Lexington Association has asked for any spots not taken for their pastors, and will scholarship their pastors.

- Pastors Monthly Conference. In February, pastors will have an opportunity to attend a private screening of the new movie, "God's Not Dead". This is an exciting movie that is relative to today's culture. In the movie, college students must sign a paper stating "God is dead" to get a passing grade in the class. A lone Christian student, cannot sign the paper, and is required to defend the antithesis and convince his classmates that God is not dead, or fail the course. The March Pastors Conference will be on the importance of Pastors being a Band of Brothers around fellow Pastors to offer encouragement and accountability. We will also be talking about forming Pastor Accountability Groups for those interested.

- There are serious facility needs and limited funds: serious problems with the roof and parking lot; carpet over 20 years old; plumbing issues; sink that doesn't drain; no handicapped accessible restroom; parking lot crumbling (and Insurance company has told us we have to fix it). Lowest quote received for parking lot was \$39,811. Estimate for needed repairs (paving parking lot, roof / trusses, wiring / codes, sprinklers, carpet / flooring, paint, handicapped accessible restrooms, insulation) is \$186,000. Available funds are considerably short: Building Relocation / Renovation - \$29,000; and Leonard Irwin Offering- \$5,522 (received this year). With limited funds, the options are: do nothing, renovate in phases, sell property, lease office space temporarily, purchase existing building, or purchase property & design and build a new Mission Center. None of the existing buildings that have been looked at would be suitable for our office. A recommendation was not made, but there are ongoing discussions, looking at all options. The Executive Board

will have to make the decisions, and at a minimum, the parking lot must be repaired.

9. Other Business.

Prayer was requested for Executive Board members who had an accident while coming into the parking lot.

Jerry Mize asked every pastor and member to pray, and ask their churches to pray. God will take care of us.

Alvin said times change, and we learn to do things differently. We are victims of the times we live in and need to be praying. "He that is in me is greater than He that is in the world."

10. Adjourn. Brian Goss (Lydia) closed in prayer.

Monday, April 21, 2014

1. Call to order. Alvin Burdette (Mt. Pleasant), Moderator, called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

2. Scripture Reading and Prayer. Alvin read from Matthew 28. The angel descended from heaven, rolled back the stone and sat on it so he could say to all "you thought you destroyed Him, you were wrong." We're told today we can't have Jesus at school; let's sit on the stone and say "Yes we can". Stand up! Randy Keasler led in prayer.

3. Recognition of New Members. Mike Foster (Damascus), Pastor.

4. Minutes of the January 14, 2014 Executive Board Meeting were approved as printed.

5. Stewardship Committee. Bobby Holcombe (Return), Chairman.

A. Treasurer's Report for the 1st Quarter 2014 showed income of \$42,687.17, expense \$49,172.86, with ending balance of \$37,607.81. Accepted as presented.

B. Review of 2013 Financial Records. The year ended with expense over income of (\$19,635.01). Total income was \$200,338.72 and expense was \$219,973.73. Beginning in 2010 expense has exceeded income. A new policy was implemented January 28, 2014 that all Beaverdam Baptist Association purchases/expenditures/check requests must be pre-approved by the Director of Missions. The association depends on contributions from churches; churches were encouraged to evaluate giving so ministries can continue. We're looking at many things and are making adjustments.

6. Ad-Hoc Committee (Facilities, Finances and Future). Ken Reid (College Street), Chairman. The committee has met and looked again at the list of priorities from the Property Committee. The insurance company says we must fix the parking lot and there's a hazard at the entrance; lowest quote was almost \$40,000. The building leaks, and the estimate to fix it with a hip roof is \$75,000. Other repairs and renovations are needed. We went back to building inspector and the cost to renovate/repair was

reduced, however, the committee does not feel we need to invest more in this building.

A lot of committees have had discussions in the past about what to do with the building. Offers have been made to swap our present location for a new location and building, but have not been accepted. Information was shared on comparable properties sold along Hwy. 123, ranging from \$650,000 - \$850,000, and other properties currently for sale that list for \$699,000 to \$1,350,000.

The recommendation of the committee is that we "place our present property on the market 'For Sale By Owner' for \$1.2 million. The Association will accept sealed bids from prospective buyers. At any point during this process if an acceptable offer is received by the Ad-Hoc Committee, a special emergency meeting of the Executive Board will be called to approve the acceptance of the offer. If the Association has not received a satisfactory offer after six months the Ad Hoc Committee will consider other options to facilitate the sale of the property."

The floor was opened for question/discussion. Insurance company has not imposed a time limit for repair of the parking lot. If a good bid is received, we will not wait 6 months to call a meeting. Additional information on comparable properties sold was given.

Vote on the motion to put the property on the market as stated in the recommendation was taken, and the motion was approved unanimously.

Motion was made to give our Director of Missions authority to obtain 3 bids from local reputable contractors to fix the trouble spots in the parking lot (storm drain, pot holes and loose asphalt) at the lowest possible price. Motion was seconded. Vote was taken and the motion carried.

Alvin expressed appreciation for the members of the Ad Hoc Committee.

7. Director of Missions Report. David Shirley reported on the Pastors/Wives Retreat with Dennis Swanberg. It was a wonderful time and had the largest group attending – 104 people. The point of the weekend was encouraging those who serve our churches.

Upcoming events: April's Pastors Conference (Baptist Foundation presenting program and providing lunch); Pastors Accountability Group; May's Pastors Conference (Domestic Violence).

Canada. Brett Myers has begun the journey to Calgary. This will open up new ministry for us next year as we continue the partnership with Southwinds Church. We are sending teams this summer from Corinth Westminster, Hepsibah, New Hope, Seneca and Westminster to lead soccer camps. Next year we will work with Brett in the Mahogany neighborhood.

Associational missions week is May 18 - 25. The Leonard Irwin Offering has been designated to buy a new inflatable to replace the old one. It was used when we bought it, and has been sewn and duct taped. Let your folks know what the association does.

The Hispanic church was well on its way, but Pastor Jerry has backed out of starting a church here. He was doing tv ministry and pastoring, and decided that his plate was just too full. We've been in touch with SCBC's Scott Shields.

Associational Children's Camp is August 3-7. We had one of our larger camps last year – 114 campers and staffers. It's a tremendous week of camp, and pastors were urged to send their children this year, especially if they have never been. Registration packets have been mailed out.

Financial. The 2008 budget was \$240,442, compared with the 2014 budget of \$227,019. At no time since 2008 have expenses exceeded budget, but beginning in 2010, expenses have exceeded income. In 2009 net income/expense was \$32,359, but there was no DOM.

Giving by churches has decreased every year since 2008. In 2013 total giving by churches was \$196,585, averaging \$16,382 per month. The 2014 budget is \$227,019: amount needed per month is \$18,918, while average giving (January-March) is \$14,729. Presently we are projecting a monthly shortage of \$4,689, or \$56,268 for the year.

The budget is broken down into Personnel, Operations and Ministry. At this point money for ministry has been non-existent, and we were not able to help with the community fun days this year. We are trying to be good stewards.

Church Planting. It's been a while since a church was planted in our association: Golden Corner 1993; Mountain View 1965; Bounty Land in 1954. One area of the county where there's not a church is between Lydia, Ebenezer, Wolf Stake, Lake Keowee and Duke Power. Don't think of the county in geographic terms; think in terms of people groups we are not reaching – low income, apartments, mobile homes. What if we planted a church and targeted people that are totally not reached. Unreached people groups exist in our county. Our desire is to Impact Oconee – existing churches planting churches. Be praying about that.

8. Other Business.

Jerry Mize (Mountain View) made a motion that letters be sent to Clemson University and Coach Dabo Swinney to let them know that the churches of the association stand with them in their response to complaints from the Freedom From Religion Foundation. Motion was seconded and passed.

9. Adjourn. Brian Goss (Lydia) dismissed in prayer.

Monday, July 14, 2014

1. Call to order. Alvin Burdette (Mt. Pleasant), Moderator, called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. at the Beaverdam Mission Center.

2. Scripture Reading and Prayer. Alvin read Isaiah 55:8-13 and opened in prayer.

3. Recognition of New Members. Norman Winchester (Mountain View); Tim Cobb (Holly Springs); Billy Davis (Poplar Springs); Stacey Griffis (Beaverdam); Christopher Hulse (Ebenezer); Anna Hall (Little River).

4. Minutes of the April 14, 2014 Executive Board Meeting were approved as printed.

5. Stewardship Committee / Treasurer's Report. Bobby Holcombe (Return) reported contributions from churches were \$55,429.77 for the 2nd quarter and \$98,116.94 for the year. Expense were \$46,800.65 for the quarter, a net profit of \$8,629, and \$95,973.51 for the year, a net profit of \$2,143.43. He expressed appreciation for the increase in giving and asked churches to continue to support the association and what it does.

6. Ad-Hoc Committee (Facilities, Finances and Future). Ken Reid (College Street) gave an update on the attempt to sell the property. A "For Sale" banner was purchased and put on the front of the building. One verbal offer has been received, but nothing in writing, and we have had other contacts. He encouraged members to help get the word out. The leaking roof is getting worse. Minor patching was done in the parking lot and the drain repaired at a very minimal cost of \$300.

The committee is actively working. One of the sub-committees is looking at possible temporary office space if the building sells, and is in negotiations with Seneca Baptist. Another sub-committee is addressing possible relocation sites. Another sub-committee, looking at the budget and finances, met with our staff. The following recommendation came from the staff and was presented by the committee:

The Ad-Hoc Committee recommended that beginning October 1, 2014 the full-time ministry assistant position be reduced to a part-time 24-hour workweek; that the part-time position be increased from 20 to 24-hours. One person would work on Monday and one on Thursday, and both would work Tuesday and Wednesday. The office would be open Monday through Thursday, and closed on Friday.

SC Baptist Convention did a study of a 5-day versus 4-day week that showed that closing on Friday would result in significant savings in utilities alone.

The floor was opened for discussion. Most associations are closed on Friday. The full-time position would go from full-time 40 hours to part-time 24 hours. Neither positions would have benefits. Vote on the recommendation passed unanimously.

7. Director of Missions Report. David Shirley (Seneca) presented certificates on behalf of the International Mission Board for the 2013 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering.

Westminster Baptist was recognized for top per capita giving. Seneca Baptist was recognized for top giving church.

Calgary Partnership. Bo Neal, pastor of Southwinds Church, and Brett Myers, NAMB MSC, are planting a church in Mahogany, a new residential neighborhood which is under construction. When completed about 40-45 thousand people will be living in that community. Brett asked for help getting 200+ Bibles to give to the kids at the summer camps. They were running low and didn't have funds to buy them. The request for \$2,500 was sent out (cost of 16 cases / 256 Bibles). A lot of churches responded, some giving their VBS offering, and others are still sending. Individuals contributed as well. Thus far, \$3,768.74 has been received from 14 churches and 6 individuals. Sixteen cases were shipped and Brett has received them. We will continue receiving donations and hope to keep a constant supply of Bibles going to Canada.

This summer several teams are going to Calgary with members from Corinth Westminster, Hepsibah, New Hope, Seneca, and Westminster. Thirteen churches have sent teams to Calgary since 2010.

Children's Camp starts on August 3rd and ends August 7th. One hundred thirteen are currently registered – 67 children, 20 chaperones and 26 staff. Information was sent out about Mission Care Packets that the children will be putting together and distributing – the younger children at a nursing home in Winnsboro and the older kids in Rock Hill. Why is Children's Camp so important? Because 19 out of 20 Christians were saved before the age of 25. After that age, it becomes increasingly more difficult.

Women's Conference on Domestic Violence Awareness (A Call To Action) was held on July 7 and had 100 in attendance, including 52 ladies representing 13 BBA churches. Thanks to Vickie Lee for getting the word out about the conference to the WMU ladies.

Finances. It has been extremely challenging these last several months. We're trying to be good stewards and manage expenses, and are ahead \$7,310.96 for the year through July. Based on where we are now, a shortage of 32,000 is projected for 2014. Statistics from the 2008 and 2013 ACPs were presented:

One of our greatest needs today is for the church in America to display New Testament Christianity (passion & commitment) in the twenty-first century. Francis Chan walked away from a church with 5,000 members, and spent time in China and India. He said "The church in America must become less attached to the world and more focused on eternity." If we really believe in a place called Hell it will change the way we do church. Jesus last words

were "Go and be my witness." All authority in heaven and earth has been given to us to go and make disciples.

David shared the journey he has been on and what God has burned within his heart to do. He said "As I've shared with leadership and every committee, I want to be missional, no longer sitting behind a desk and counting pennies." He's not resigning and wants to stay here as long as the association will have him.

He talked about how we get caught up in the machinery of church, missing the "making disciples" part of it, and that we need to rethink it. He shared several quotes from Ed Stetzer, author of Comeback Churches about being missional:

"Being missional means moving intentionally beyond our church preferences, making missional decisions rather than preferential decisions."

"... The most effective comeback churches will be those that intentionally think like missionaries in their context."

"When Jesus said, 'As the Father has sent me, I also send you' (1 John 20:21), the mandate was not for a select group of cross-cultural missionaries. It was a commission to you, to me, and to our churches."

"We have a sender (Jesus), a message (the gospel), and a people to whom we are sent (those in our culture). It is worth the effort to go beyond personal preferences and attractional methods to proclaim the gospel in our churches and outside the walls."

In John 4 Jesus sat down by the well, and a woman came out to get water around noon. She was a loner, an outcast, looked down on, and nobody really had interest in her. When she met Jesus, she left her water pot behind and ran into town telling everyone about Him. When she came back leading a flock of people from town, Jesus said "the fields are white unto harvest".

The Well will be a multi-ethnic congregation meeting at Seneca High School Auditorium starting Sunday, September 7 at 4:00 p.m. Plans are to meet every other week. The official launch will be in the spring of 2015. They have no desire to take people from other churches.

He shared demographics of the 3 mile area around Code which shows 17,687 people in 7,345 households; 72% are Caucasian and 20% African-American; 49% are employed and 50.1% are not in the work force; 45% (7,959) are involved in the faith community and 55% (9,728) are not involved.

The Well exists to help people find, follow, and be like Jesus, to reach people for Christ and make a difference. Reaching 5% of the 9,728 uninvolved would be 486 people.

History of the Well. David's daughter and son-in-law, coaches at Seneca, started having the football lineman over on Tuesdays for supper, and a devotion. They invited the boys to go to church with them, and one Sunday morning, two boys were waiting on their front steps. Next week two became four, and now as many as nineteen boys go with them. The boys want a church in Seneca

where they can bring their moms, dads and sisters. That began to birth this church plant.

Upcoming Events: Men's Ministry Quarterly Fellowship - August 5 at Scenic Heights. Pastors Conference - August 12 in the evening, a time of encouragement for pastors and their wives. McKayla Sanders, a student at North Greenville, will share her story about her dad, a pastor who committed suicide.

8. Other Business. None.

The committee would like an additional 2½ months to make sure we can do what needs to be done. When the offer is finalized, a special meeting will be called. The committee is considering several options, some of which we have looked at before. We have a solid commitment from Seneca Baptist for temporary office space should this property sell, however details are yet to be finalized.

Randy made a motion that we keep the building 'for sale by owner' without going through a realtor through December.

Alvin restated the recommendation from the committee to extend the original motion from 6 months to the end of the year. There were no questions, and the vote was taken. The motion carried.

8. Director of Missions Report. David Shirley (Seneca) recently attended a conference about the future of associations presented by the North American Mission Board. A lot of the things that were shared we have already done. We are managing expenditures and doing everything in our power to keep the finances in the black, but it's tough ministry wise. Thus far we are projecting missing this year's budget by \$27,000 or \$28,000.

The proposed 2015 budget is \$188,970, a cut of \$38,049 to a budget that was already bare bones. The last time the association's budget was in that range was 1997. He called attention to some of the changes in the proposed budget: increase in Pastoral Ministries (\$1,000 for Pastors /Wives Retreat); cuts to WMU and Countywide Crusade; no funding for Christian Learning Centers or Counseling Center (Dr. George retired and Greenville Health System chose to discontinue the counseling service partnership with the association, which provided funding of \$10,000 in our budget); increase to DOM Mission Team Leadership of \$1,000 (next year there will be two churches in Canada instead of one). These changes to the budget will allow us money to do ministry.

Personnel changes were highlighted: increase in DOM salary (\$1,000 pay raise, and \$3,000 moved from housing to salary); decrease in Brenda's salary and benefits (from full time to part time); decrease in DOM Insurance (changed from family to individual). Total decrease to Personnel was \$27,599.

2015 Children's Camp will be August 3-7 at White Oak. Jeremy Garrett, pastor at Open Door, will be Camp Director, and Chad Carroll will assist him as needed. Camp is worship, personal quiet times, large and small group Bible study, and mission adventures.

This year was the 18th year of camp. We had 126 campers (76 children, 23 adult chaperones, and 27 staff). David was camp pastor the first year, and this year a former staffer returned as the camp pastor. The theme was LEGACY: THE LIFE OF PAUL. For their 'Mission Adventures', the children visited with 112 residents of a Nursing Home in Winnsboro, and distributed care packets. The older

children went to a low income area in Rock Hill and distributed care packets to 150 homes. Many were touched through this children's camp.

Pastors Conference is Tuesday, October 14 at 11:00 AM. Reiny Koschel, Laurens Association DOM, will present an introduction to "Simply the Story", a great way to share the message of the Bible. This is for Pastors, church staff, and anyone who works with children. Lunch will be provided, but register with the association office so we will know the number to prepare for.

Canada Partnership. We are continuing our Calgary partnership but will now work with two churches: Southwinds Cranston, with Pastor Bo Neal, and Southwinds Mahogany which will launch on Easter 2015, with Brett Myers. There may be a need for four teams each week, contingent on them providing housing. This year Corinth Westminster, Hepsibah, New Hope, Seneca, Utica and Westminster sent mission teams. Since 2010, thirteen churches have sent teams/people to Calgary.

Pastor Appreciation Month. David encouraged members to love on and show appreciation to their pastors and their families during the month of October. There has never been a more challenging time to serve as pastor.

Finances. As of October 6, we are \$1,500 ahead. Our goal is to keep it in the black. Giving to the Association has steadily declined since 2008, but this year an upswing is projected over last year. Based on the 2013 Annual Church Profile, Baptisms were up, but Membership and AM Worship Attendance were down. David encouraged churches get their 2014 ACPs in – they tell a story and are very helpful to us.

The Well has met for 5 weeks on Sundays at Seneca High School. A multi-ethnic church, it is reaching folks who have never been in church in their life. There have been three salvations. Average attendance is 107, and average weekly giving is \$1,047.06. Not a single person from our churches has united with the Well, and not a penny of money is coming from the association.

Beaverdam's Annual Meeting will be October 27, 2014 at Hepsibah Baptist Church starting at 6:45 PM.

Men's Quarterly Fellowship will be Tuesday, November 4 at Pleasant Ridge.

Future of Associationalism Conference. David shared information from the conference he recently attended. Associations are facing their greatest challenge ever that NAMB said is related to a generational shift with very little loyalty to the association, state or national convention. Younger leaders see things differently, and have different priorities.

Associations must address several issues to meet these challenges: who we are and how to connect with our audience; DOM viewed as a local missionary who leads churches to partner with other churches, especially larger churches with smaller churches providing resources, advice and manpower; funding challenges (many associations today can financially support personnel or ministry but not both ... consider downsizing staff, such as

DOM full-time, part-time, bi-vocational, or shared). Hard decisions have to be made.

There are two types of DOM: the Maintaining DOM (defines 'success' as a pastor in every pulpit and no churches dealing with conflict), and the Missional DOM (catalyst for ministry, who challenges pastors and churches to be on mission).

The Association of the Future will require churches to grasp ownership of the association. The association exists to and for the churches for ministry equipping/training, vision casting, and missional involvement/engagement. Cooperation between the churches that make up the association of the future will be a necessity. Cooperation = helping churches build coalitions that serve communities together.

Missional. The associations and churches must submit to Christ's call to "Go". There also has to be a passion for impacting lostness: 70% lostness in North America, 89% in the Northwest; 92% lostness in the West, and 73% in the South (Bible Belt). In Oconee County, less than 10,000 people are in church.

The Association of the future must be willing to take risks in order to go where we've never gone before; ask what does God want us to do in this county, and how do we get involved in that; be willing to engage lostness and push back darkness; and have a passion for lost people.

We must be aware of our surroundings: culturally, geographically, demographically, and socio-economically. The largest growing population group in Seneca is Hispanics, and there's not a church in our area. The church plant with Pastor Jerry Zepa fell through.

What groups are we missing? There are unreached people groups in Oconee County. The Well is going after the woman at the well, the prostitute, the man with leprosy, the hopeless and hurting. We have to be visionary and willing to go where we've never gone before. Darkness is closing in. We've got a job to do.

Associations MUST have a heart and understanding of partnerships at home and long distance to impact lostness. What if 66 churches came together to do long distance mission partnerships to hook up with pastors in places where there is lot of lostness?

The challenges are great, and the association's staff are doing everything within our power to make it work to the point of making sacrifices. We are committed to being relevant, impactful and on mission.

Responding to a question from the floor about the budget, David clarified the change in his insurance from family to individual coverage: his wife and daughter are covered through Kathy's teaching position.

Alan Adam, pastor at Parkway, who shares the same passion, was involved in the Hispanic church plant and Parkway was going to host the church. He has contacted Scott Shields at SCBC about the Hispanic ministry void. We are still trying to find a pastor who is willing to take the ball and run with it, but right now don't have that person. SCBC and NAMB are willing to help with funding but that may not be enough. At the present, the association can't meet the financial needs.

Chris Moss suggested looking at our seminaries. A lot of Latino guys are coming to Southern Baptist seminaries and may be interested in staying in the states. Contact so far has been Scott Shields at SCBC.

Randy Koon led in pray for God to open the door for a Hispanic Church.

David can make copies of the demographic reports for Oconee County on request.

9. Other Business

Steve Black stated we need to be concerned about the Sunday alcohol sales referendum that will be on the ballot in November, and need to be vocal about it.

10. Adjourn. There was a motion and second and the meeting was adjourned.
