From the AMS/DOM,

Next month, I will celebrate my 14th year of serving as the Director of Missions/Associational Mission Strategists for the Beaverdam Baptist Association. Without a doubt, my time here has been one of the highlights of my 35 years in full-time Christian ministry. I remember the thoughts that I experienced in early 2010 when I was praying about leaving my position as Pastor of Mountain Creek Baptist Church in Greenville to become the director of missions of the Beaverdam Baptist Association. There were many questions. Was it God's will for my life? Would I still have opportunities to preach? Would I be able to help and encourage pastors who were facing challenging times? Was I qualified to consult and advise churches that were also facing challenging times? The questions were many and the prayers were genuine as I sought God's guidance and His will for my life and ministry.

I remember one phone call that I received from a friend in the ministry after it was announced that I had been called as the new director of missions for the Beaverdam Association. My friend told me "lovingly" that he would have never left the pastorate to become a DOM because most associations were dying and many others were mostly irrelevant. It was not the most encouraging conversation. Recently, I ran across an article written by Jason Lowe, who serves as the associational missions strategist for the Pike Baptist Association in southeastern Kentucky. He wrote the article for *SBC Life* and in the article, he addresses the perceptions that some have regarding the association today. Below is an exert from his article in *SBC Life*.

The earliest Baptist associations were formed in 1707—that's 138 years prior to the formation of the SBC. In more recent years, Southern Baptists have questioned whether associations are still relevant to churches in the twenty-first century. The results of a 2017 study on the perceived value of Baptist associations were not encouraging:

When asked to describe the most exciting aspect of their association, the most popular answer among Southern Baptist church leaders was, "Nothing." When asked to describe the most frustrating aspect of their local Baptist association, two of the three most popular answers among church leaders were, "The association is irrelevant" and "Lack of association strategy, vision, or purpose." Only 58.5 percent of church leaders indicated that their church would be negatively affected if their local Baptist association ceased to exist.

However, I believe the perception of associations has been slowly but steadily improving in recent years. Why have churches suddenly become more receptive to their association?

- 1. Associations are nimble. In other words, associations should be able to adapt to changing circumstances quickly.
- 2. Associations are local. Every community has its own unique context. Associations can provide immense value to churches because they are a part of the same community and they understand the territory. There is great value in knowing that other churches in the area are facing similar circumstances.
- 3. Associations are built on relationships. Because of the proximity to the churches in my association, I'm able to know many of their members by name. Pastors are able to get to know other pastors as well. Their wives get to know one another. Over the years, we've been able to develop a significant level of mutual trust. When a crisis hits, you often turn first to those you know and trust. This is one of the biggest reasons that the first call that many church leaders made was to their local association office and other churches within the local association.
- 4. Associations can share resources easily. In the early days of the pandemic, churches responded in some creative ways. One of the most creative was to conduct drive-in services. As more and more churches began to explore this option, it became difficult to purchase short-range radio transmitters to broadcast worship services. Several churches in my association began to offer to share their transmitter with other churches who had not yet been able to purchase one. Again, this is much easier to do in a local association.
- 5. Associations can help in a variety of ways. Associations provide assistance to their churches in a greater variety of ways than any other SBC entity.

Southern Baptists firmly believe that we can accomplish more for the Kingdom of God when we work together. The local association is one of the oldest examples of this belief in action. Associations have been around for more than three hundred years in North America, and I'm so thankful that they are still here for such a time as this.

As we enter 2024, I want to thank you for the privilege of serving as the AMS/DOM for this association. I also want to challenge every pastor, every church staff minister, and every church to support the association as we strive to be an effective, relevant, and impactful example demonstrating what a group of committed leaders and churches can do together.
